THE CITY HOPE STORY

In the early months of 2021, a small group of families found themselves drawn together by a shared faith and a vision for a close-knit community of believers. With hearts full of hope and determination, they embarked on a journey that would lead to the birth of a new church.

The story began with six families, each with a desire to deepen their spiritual lives and connect with others who shared their beliefs. They recognized the importance of building relationships within their community, so they decided to start four home groups where they could come together regularly to pray, study, and support one another.

As the months went by, the bonds between these families grew stronger, and their collective faith flourished. They felt a calling to expand their reach beyond their home groups, so they decided to gather once a month in the welcoming space of the Rose Hill Clubhouse. These monthly meetings quickly became cherished moments of worship, fellowship, and growth.

Word of their gatherings began to spread, and more people found themselves drawn to the warmth and authenticity of these gatherings. With a growing number of attendees, the decision was made to transition from monthly meetings to weekly gatherings, allowing for a more consistent and impactful experience for all who attended.

However, their journey was not without its challenges. The group had a vision to meet in a more centralized and accessible location, but multiple times they faced doors closing when seeking venues. Yet, amidst the uncertainty, they persevered, trusting that a path would be revealed in due time.

And true to their faith, a breakthrough arrived. In an unexpected turn of events, a door swung open that had previously been firmly shut. The group was granted the opportunity to meet at the John Paul II Catholic School—an answered prayer that filled them with gratitude and a renewed sense of purpose.

Finally, on a crisp January morning in 2022, the culmination of their efforts and unwavering faith came to fruition. With hearts full of joy and anticipation, they officially launched City Hope Church. The name held deep significance, symbolizing their commitment to being a beacon of hope in the city, a place where faith, community, and love would flourish.

The launch service was a testament to the unity and resilience of this small but mighty congregation. As they stood together in worship, surrounded by friends, family, and newcomers, they knew that their journey was just beginning. City Hope Church was born out of the collective dreams, prayers, and efforts of those six families, and it is now a place where anyone seeking hope, connection, and a deeper relationship with God can find a home.

Today, hundreds of people attend City Hope Church. We invite you to see for yourself how exciting church can be when the focus is simple and people are free to seek God with passion.

Small Groups Model

We base our Small Groups model on the early church as described in the Bible in the book of Acts. In Acts, you can read about how small group meetings in homes helped lay the foundation for tremendous growth in the first church in Jerusalem.

Things to know about City Hope Small Groups:

1. Our groups are "free market."

We want people to gather together based on things they enjoy and are important to them. Essentially, the things you are already doing in your life are the things that can make up

your Small Group! From sports groups to lunch groups, parenting groups to student groups, Bible study groups to creative arts groups, our groups are as varied as we are.

2. There are three semesters every year.

Life flows in seasons, and we want to make it easy for you to be in the right Small Group for you in each season. This is why we have new groups that start and stop three times a year in what we refer to as "semesters."

3. Everyone can join a group.

Our hope is for every person at City Hope to be connected in a meaningful community through a Small Group. With so many groups to choose from, we are confident there is a group that is a great fit for you. Once you find a few groups that interest you, contact the leaders to learn more and make plans to check them out in person.

4. Anyone can host a group.

We believe hosting a group is simple because we all have something to offer others. Whether it's something you are passionate about, an experience you've had that can help others, or an area in which you are looking to grow, hosting a group is a great way to bring people together in a meaningful community.





USING YOUR SPIRITUAL GIFTS

Congratulations on discovering your spiritual gifts! God uniquely created you and gave you these gifts for a reason. Now that you've identified how He has gifted you, your next step is to learn how you can use those gifts for the purpose He has for you. On the following pages, you can learn about your spiritual gifts and find out more about the areas available to serve at City Hope in which you can best use your gifts.

Leadership - Leadership aids the body by leading and directing members to accomplish the goals and purposes of the church. Leadership motivates people to work together in unity toward common goals (Rom. 12.8).

Administration - Persons with the gift of administration lead the body by steering others to remain on task. Administration enables the body to organize according to God-given purposes and long-term goals (1 Cor. 12.28).

Teaching - Teaching is instructing members in the truths and doctrines of God's Word for the purposes of building up, unifying, and maturing the body (1 Cor. 12.28; Rom. 12.7; Eph. 4.11).

Knowledge - The gift of knowledge manifests itself in teaching and training in discipleship. It is the God-given ability to learn, know, and explain the precious truths of God's Word. A word of knowledge is a Spirit-revealed truth (1 Cor. 12.28).

Wisdom - Wisdom is the gift that discerns the work of the Holy Spirit in the body and applies His teachings and actions to the needs of the body (1 Cor. 12.28).

Prophecy - The gift of prophecy is proclaiming the Word of God boldly. This builds up the body and leads to conviction of sin. Prophecy manifests itself in preaching and teaching (1 Cor. 12.10; Rom. 12.6).

Discernment - Discernment aids the body by recognizing the true intentions of those within or related to the body. Discernment tests the message and actions of others for the protection and well-being of the body (1 Cor. 12.10).

Exhortation - Possessors of this gift encourage members to be involved in and enthusiastic about the work of the Lord. Members with this gift are good counselors and motivate others to service. Exhortation exhibits itself in preaching, teaching, and ministry (Rom. 12.8).

Shepherding - The gift of shepherding is manifested in persons who look out for the spiritual welfare of others. Although pastors, like shepherds, do care for members of the church, this gift is not limited to a pastor or staff member (Eph. 4.11).

Faith - Faith trusts God to work beyond the human capabilities of the people. Believers with this gift encourage others to trust in God in the face of apparently insurmountable odds (1 Cor. 12.9).

Evangelism - God gifts his church with evangelists to lead others to Christ effectively and enthusiastically. This gift builds up the body by adding new members to its fellowship (Eph. 4.11).

Apostleship - The church sends apostles from the body to plant churches or be missionaries. Apostles motivate the body to look beyond its walls in order to carry out the Great Commission (1 Cor. 12.28; Eph. 4.11).

Service/Helps - Those with the gift of service/helps recognize practical needs in the body and joyfully give assistance to meeting those needs. Christians with this gift do not mind working behind the scenes (1 Cor. 12.28; Rom. 12.7).

Mercy - Cheerful acts of compassion characterize those with the gift of mercy. Persons with this gift aid the body by empathizing with hurting members. They keep the body healthy and unified by keeping others aware of the needs within the church (Rom. 12.8).

Giving - Members with the gift of giving give freely and joyfully to the work and mission of the body. Cheerfulness and liberality are characteristics of individuals with this gift (Rom. 12.8).

Hospitality - Those with this gift have the ability to make visitors, guests, and strangers feel at ease. They often use their home to entertain guests. Persons with this gift integrate new members into the body (1 Pet. 4.9).

As an essential part of the City Hope Church Leadership family, you have a responsibility to develop and exhibit mature Christian behavior.

This should be the basic premise of your desire to participate in a servant-leader position here at City Hope.

While serving the Body of Christ as a servant-leader at City Hope Church, you pledge to present a good appearance at all times. In both attire and behavior, you should strive to demonstrate Biblical standards in all situations.

As Christians, the way we present ourselves to others is of vital importance to the way others perceive Christ. Our conduct should never be an embarrassment to Christ but should exemplify the best qualities of a mature believer and servant-leader.

Exemplifying the highest moral commitment, City Hope Church leaders are to maintain a disciplined life of Bible reading, prayer, and fasting. You must also refrain from such things as:

- Profanity
- Indulging in much wine or other alcoholic beverages
- Dishonest gain
- Illicit drugs
- Pornography
- Sexual immorality (sexual activity outside of marriage)
- All behaviors that might cause Christ to grieve and others to stumble

By providing an example in speech and action, we encourage others to grow in Christ and become servant-leaders themselves. This is a way of life measured by the heart and commitment of each leader in the City Hope Church family. We should regard it as an essential part of our development, not as an imposition or restriction.
